Two Community Leaders Mark Sixth Anniversary At Spring Hill Church

A real leader in the community is Rev. Gay Chambers who is starting his sixth year as pastor of the Spring Hill Baptist Church. His roots are well fixed in the community for he was born and raised at Retreat in East Pigeon.

Graduating from Bethel High School, Mr. Chambers attended WCTC and Duke University. In addition he did summer work at Lake Junaluska. Fifteen years ago he married Evelyn Galloway.

For ten years he was pastor of Riverside Baptist Church at Cecil, and for three years he served at Mt. Zion in East Pigeon. Another year was spent as pastor at Iron Duff.

Since coming to Spring Hill, Rev. Chambers has given unsparingly of his time and money. An entire year's salary was donated to the building of the new church. When it was burned shortly after completion, Rev. Chambers gave a half year's salary to the building of the one just completed.

For a number of years he was director of the Haywood County Training Union. Currently he is program chairman of the CDP, as well as being half time pastor at Hatchliffe Cove Baptist Church.

In addition to church work, he has taught in the Bethel district schools for 25 years, and this year will be principal of Cruso schools.

Despite all his contributions, however, he will admit his part with the words, "The people did the work."

Mrs. Chambers has not been idle in the meantime. For 15 years she has taught at Spring Hill school, plus another three years at Cecil.
