## Bowling League Rolls On

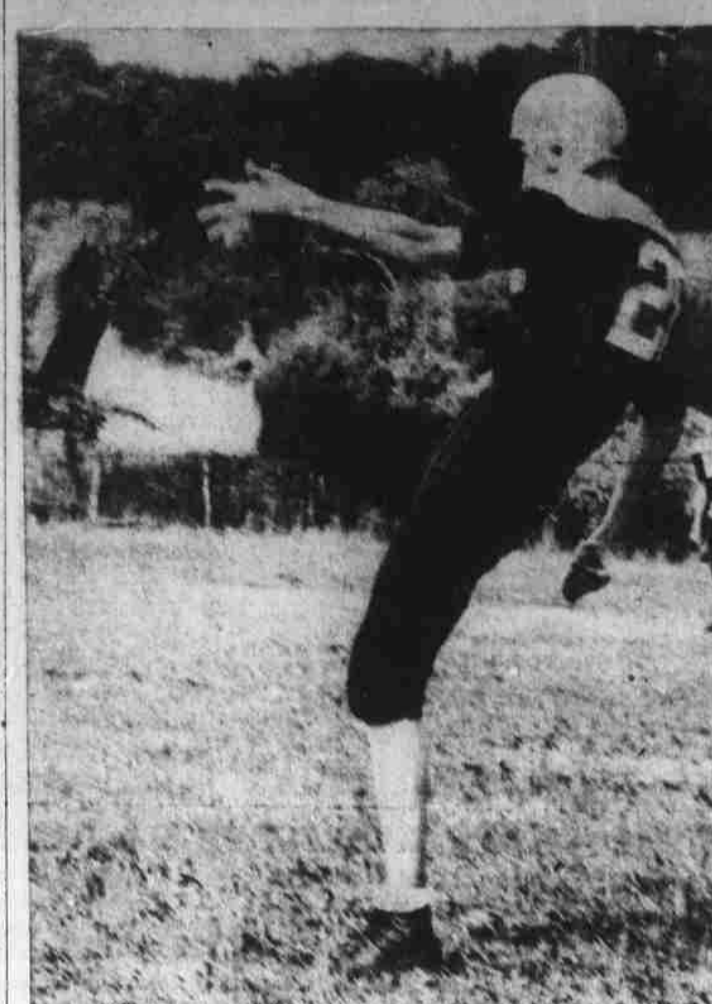
