Miss Robina Miller, chaplain.

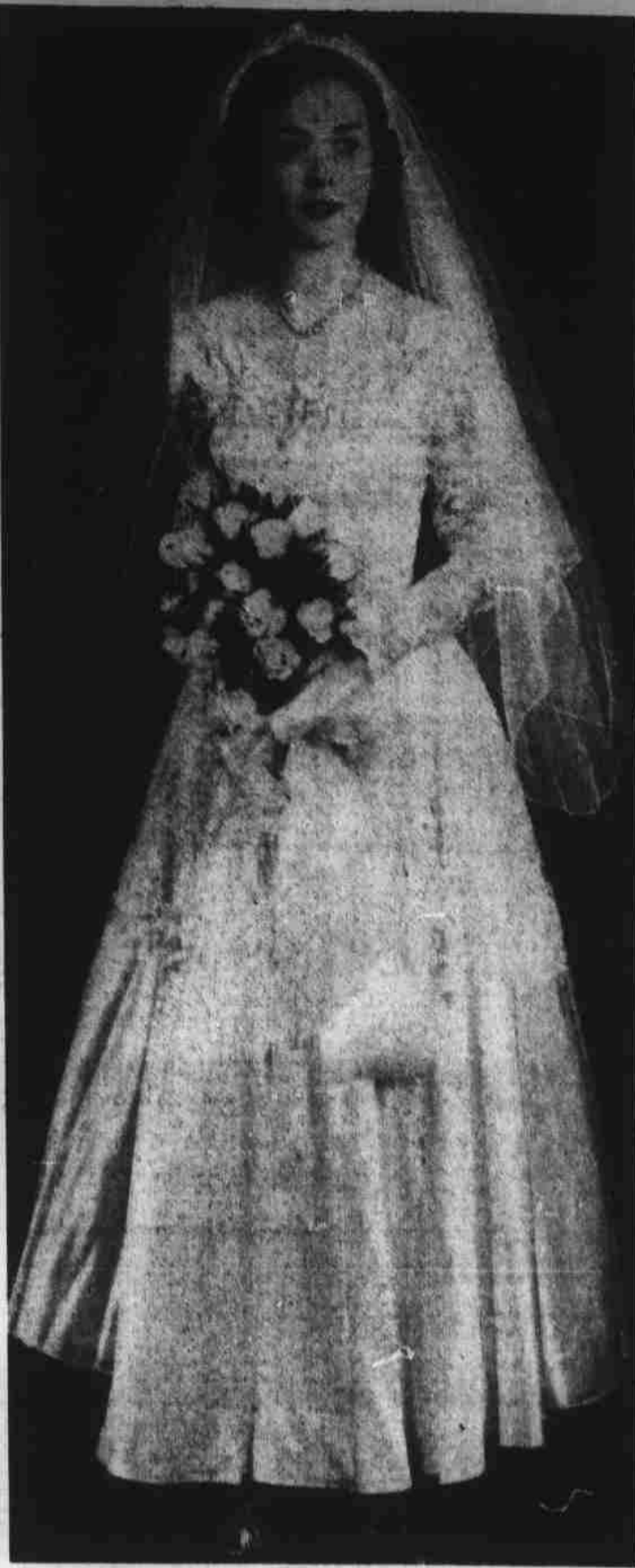
Mrs. R. N. Barber and Mrs. J.

Mrs. Charles Ketter.

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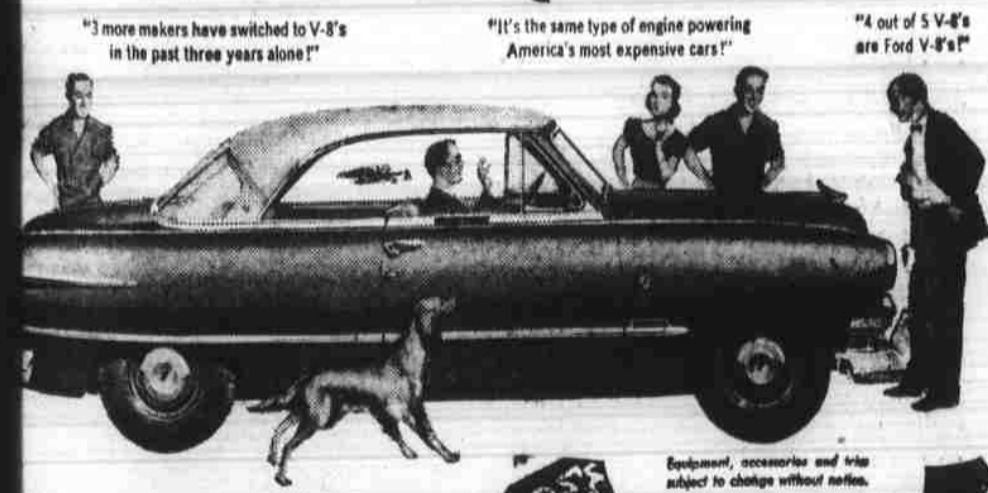
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
