"Rotary fills a need for fellowship, as well as offers an opportunity for service. Rev. Williamson climaxed his address by telling of the growth and accomplishments of the Rotary Foundation—a fund of \$2,750,000 raised by each Rotarian's giving \$10. The fund is used to enable worthy students to receive a year's post graduate study in some university other than their own land. Since this project was begun five years ago, more than 284 students have received awards from the foundation. These have come from 42 different countries, and have completed their studies and gone back to their native land as ambassadors of goodwill. Such is the service of Rotary.
