The Rochester's crew visited Kilauea Crater in Hawaii National Park located on the slopes of Mauna Loa about 30 miles from Hilo. They stood at the foot of the 700-foot deep fire pit and took pictures of steam vapors rising from gaping holes in the hardened lava.
