A new method of artificial respiration—to replace the prone pressure method widely used for years—has been adopted by the American Red Cross and other U. S. agencies, according to Dr. I. M. Weir, county health officer, in charge of Red Cross first aid and water safety work in the area.

The new system is known as the back pressure-arm lift method. It was adopted on the recommendation of the National Research Council after the presentation of scientific evidence at an Oct. 1 meeting sponsored by the Red Cross and Public Health Service.

The Red Cross is proceeding now to provide all its chapters with instruction in this new method of artificial respiration. Regional meetings have been scheduled throughout the country for training of key instructors from local chapters.

The Waynesville Red Cross chapter will be represented at a meeting in Asheville this month by Mrs. Ethel McMurris and Mrs. Frank Miller. Instructors will come to Asheville from Atlanta.

"Everyone in Haywood county should acquire this simple knowledge that might save his or her neighbor's life," Dr. Weir asserted. As an organization founded on the principle of neighbor-held-neighbor, your Red Cross is here to place this knowledge within reach of every citizen in the community.

"The back pressure-arm lift method," Dr. Weir pointed out, "is not new. It has stood the test of years of use by Red Cross societies in Denmark, Norway, and other European countries, which have found that this improved method produced a greater exchange of air in the victim's lungs than the prone pressure method."

"The basic difference is the back pressure-arm lift method and the prone pressure is that the former, being a two-phase operation, actively forces air into the lungs as well as to expel it."

"The prone pressure method, on the other hand, forces the air out but depends on the elastic recoil of the chest and internal organs to bring air into the lungs. This difference is particularly important in cases of deep asphyxia, such as might be caused by nerve gas."

Other agencies adopting the back pressure-arm lift method at this time include the Armed Forces, American Telephone and Telegraph Co., Bureau of Mines, Boy Scouts, Campfire Girls, the American Medical Association, Federal Civil Defense Administration, Girl Scouts, Public Health Service of the Federal Security Agency, and the YMCA.

Clinic For Infants Opened Here By Health Dept.

A new county health department service—a mother and infants clinic—was opened in the court house here this week. Dr. I. M. Weir, county health officer, announced today.

The clinic, which will be held from 1:30 until 3:30 p. m. the first Tuesday in each month, will be staffed by Dr. J. F. Hammett, and his wife, Dr. Doris Hammett.

Dr. J. F. Hammett will give advice on planned parenthood (birth control), while Dr. Doris Hammett will offer counsel on infant care and feeding and giving immunizations.

The new service will operate as a "well-baby" clinic Dr. Weir stated. Sick children who require medical advice and treatment should be taken to physicians, the doctor said.

The county health department also is maintaining a mothers and infants clinic in Canton.

Million Jubilee Tickets Are Sold
