standpoint of acreage, taking up 74 per cent of the total. The remaining 26 per cent was devoted to tobacco, grains, Irish potatoes, other vegetables grown for sale and all other crops including orchards, etc.
The rural population of the county as of January, 1951 was 12,882. This includes only people living on three or more acres of land. The number of cows and heifers two years old and over were: Kept mainly for milk, 5,266, and kept mainly for beef, 4,491. There were 1,051 sheep and 53,460 hens and pullets.
County crop acreage totals include:
Tobacco 1,108; wheat, 199; oats, 992; soybeans grown alone, 51; soybeans interplanted, 23; lespedeza seed, 251; soybeans and cowpeas, hay, 171; small grains cut for hay, 990; lespedeza cut for hay, 171; alfalfa cut for hay, 544; other hays, 5,621; Irish potatoes, 400; sweet potatoes, 372; peach trees, bearing age, 32; fertilizers, except lime, 3,201 tons; sows and gilts, farrowing, 139.
