Hard-Hitting Linesmen Get Letters

Wake Forest was the principal speaker and paid tribute to the community, coaches, team and band for the record which they had achieved.

The Chamber of Commerce sponsored the event, with David Felmet, president, serving as master of ceremonies, heard an urgent appeal from Jonathan Woody for support of the bond issue. He reviewed existing conditions in the schools, and the rank of Haywood in the state in the way of material things, as he cited facts to prove Haywood could afford better schools.

Admiral W. N. Thomas gave the invocation.

Dr. R. Stuart Roberson paid tribute to the coaches and team as he presented Coach Weatherly, who in turn recognized assistant coaches Ratcliff, Jaynes and Swift. Then Coach Weatherly called the roll of the 36-member 1951 squad who had earned their football letter. These were distributed after the banquet.

Coach Weatherly thanked the patrons for their loyalty, and the Athletic Committee for their work. The committee is composed of Johnny Cuddeback, Lawrence Leatherwood, and M. E. Davis. He cited others who assisted in selling tickets, and helped handle the crowds at the games.

W. A. Bradley, chairman of the band committee, presented Charles Isley, director, and Robert Campbell, assistant director, along with the marching band, the cheer leaders, drum majors and majorettes.

Dr. Boyd Owen in a humorous vein, presented Coach Rogers, speaker of the evening.

"There seems to be too much pressure being put on coaches today to just win," the Wake Forest coach pointed out. "When a coach is having a fine season, he stands high; when there are not so many games won, the same man, with the same ability as when winning, is often fired."

"The theory of win or else is making it hard on coaches, but it seems to be the trend of the day," Coach Rogers pointed out how football helped boys, and was also good for spectators. He slammed at the "smut" which is being cast in too large quantities in many instances at the game.

He kept his audience interested in a series of stories about the Wake Forest team, and climaxed his talk by citing the banquet here the best he had attended - it being the fifth of the week - and was impressed, he said, "by the sincerity which has been shown on this occasion."

During the program a group from the high school chorus gave three Christmas numbers, under the direction of Mr. Isley.

The meal was prepared under the direction of Mrs. Rufus Siler, with the 4-H Club girls serving. The menu consisted of tomato juice, apricot salad, baked ham, lima, sweet potato souffle, relishes, rolls, pudding and coffee or milk.

The closing number on the printed program was listed as "Home, Sweet Home." As the large audience stood to sing, they found themselves lustily singing the Way-
