or nothing" liquor referendum bill before a House committee on Fuesday brought hundreds of citizens from all over the state to Raleigh, Charges ranging from lightly veiled suggestions of liquor interest bribery (later retracted) and communist dictatorship by past legislative committees to failure to recognize the democratic right to vote were made by the dry forces. Others pleaded for consideration of but as a moral one, as suggested by the Governor in his inaugural message. The Governor himself reiterated his position as favoring some kind of liquor referendum, but stated that he would not push the legislature further. No committee action was taken on the bill. Meanwhile, not even a murmur went through the House as the veterans' bonus bill, once regarded as a potential storm center, received its last rites through an unfavorable report. The Senate passed by a very narrow margin the bill to legalize cap pistol caps, which now is in the House Committee on Propositions and Grievances.
