say that the Friday frost had killed many blossoms at the lower levels.

Robert McCracken, who has an orchard at Pigeon Gap, said that about one-third of his estimated crop had been killed by the severe frost Friday, but apparently no damage was caused over the weekend. His orchard is situated at a somewhat higher altitude than those in the Pigeon area, where it was expected serious damage had been done.

Franklin said today that it was extremely difficult to give a complete account of the damage for at least a week. "The kind of weather we're having is odd, to say the least. When the temperatures fall to 24 and there's no ice formations, then you just have to keep your fingers crossed and wait for a while before you can ascertain the damage that has been inflicted."
