'Woman They Almost Lynched,' Lusty Screen Fare With New Slant

"Woman They Almost Lynched" is a bang-up parcel of dynamic cinema fare which takes place in a border town at the height of the Civil War. The action revolves around a lead mine which supplies the Union Army with material for war. Although the mine supplies the bluecoats and is operated by a hard-bitten Amazon woman, Nina Varela, the border city adjacent to the mine is neutral and its citizens intend to keep it that way even if it means stringing up a man or woman by a rope from the nearest tree.

Exciting Drama En route from the East to live with her brother, Reed Hadley, proprietor of a bar, Joan Leslie's stagecoach is attacked by Quantrell's Raiders, Quantrell portrayed by Brian Donlevy. The Union soldier escort is murdered and Miss Leslie is sent on to Border City with young Jesse James, portrayed by Ben Cooper, after getting an unfavorable first look at Quantrell's wife, Kate, a dangerous, hard-as-nails and fast-shooting gal, enacted by Audrey Totter.

In Border City, Miss Leslie is disillusioned to discover her brother is not only proprietor of a saloon, but is drinking himself into a stupor over losing Kate Quantrell to the border renegade who

kidnapped her and forced her to marry him.

Robust action hits a fast pace from here on in with Quantrell and his gang showing up and Kate egging her former fiance into a shooting spree in which he is killed, in self defense, by John Lund, foreman of the lead mine and an under-revered Confederate officer.

Feminine Feud With her brother dead, Miss Leslie takes over operation of the saloon to pay off debts, romance develops between the new proprietress and Lund and a vicious feud begins between the Misses Leslie and Totter. This winds up in a tense street 'gunfight' in which Miss Leslie proves to be a sharpshooter and cripples her adversary.

In the fast-moving denouement, Quantrell tries to make a deal for ammunition with Lund by threatening to expose him as a Confederate officer. The plot blows up and Lund is forced to try a fast escape with Miss Leslie making a cover-up confession that she is an agent for the armies of the South, leading to her near lynching.

Miss Totter, impressed by Joan sparing her life, figures prominently in saving her from the lynching while Lund returns after the war to pursue his romance with Joan.

Extensive Improvements Have Been Made At Lake

Extensive improvements at the Methodist Church's southeastern summer grounds at Lake Junaluska are announced by Dr. H. G. Allen, superintendent.

In addition to a \$50,000 children's building now under construction, he said a new roof has been added to the lakeside auditorium, which seats 2,500, and a new apartment building comprising 10 housekeeping units is ready for use. Two other apartment buildings, totaling 40 family units, were built within the last three years.

The Ivey Observation Park, a new scenic point, has been completed near the outlet of Lake Junaluska so that visitors may see the waterfall. The park is a gift of J. B. Ivey, merchant and active Methodist layman of Charlotte, N. C., who sponsors the assembly's playground for children.

The 1953 season marks the 40th anniversary of the church assembly, Dr. Allen said.
