Essay Contest Is Sponsored By State UDC

A state-wide essay contest on the subject "North Carolina's A.E.F. Ace of World War I," is being held by the North Carolina Division of the United Daughters of the Confederacy. The contest is open to all children in the schools of North Carolina between the ages of twelve and twenty years and the prize for the winner will be \$25.00, to be presented at the convention of the Children of the Confederacy at the University of North Carolina, August 27-28.

The award is made possible by Mrs. John Lowe of Lexington in memory of her brother, Col. Opie Lindsay.

The rules for the contest are as follows: Essay must not contain more than 2,000 words, typed, and a bibliography attached; Essay must be signed with a fictitious name. The real name and address of the writer, must be placed in a sealed envelope and clipped to the essay. Fictitious name and subject must be written on the outside of the envelope plainly and also listed on the inside of the envelope. (Col. Opie Lindsay is a direct descendant of a Confederate Soldier; and if this is mentioned, be sure to use the term "war between the States".) The winning essay becomes the property of the Division Children of the Confederacy. Postage must be sent for the return of the non-winning essay. All essays MUST REACH Mrs. A. R. Wilson, Division Director, 1700 Lakewood Ave., Durham, N. C. by August 22 in order to be judged by the Convention.

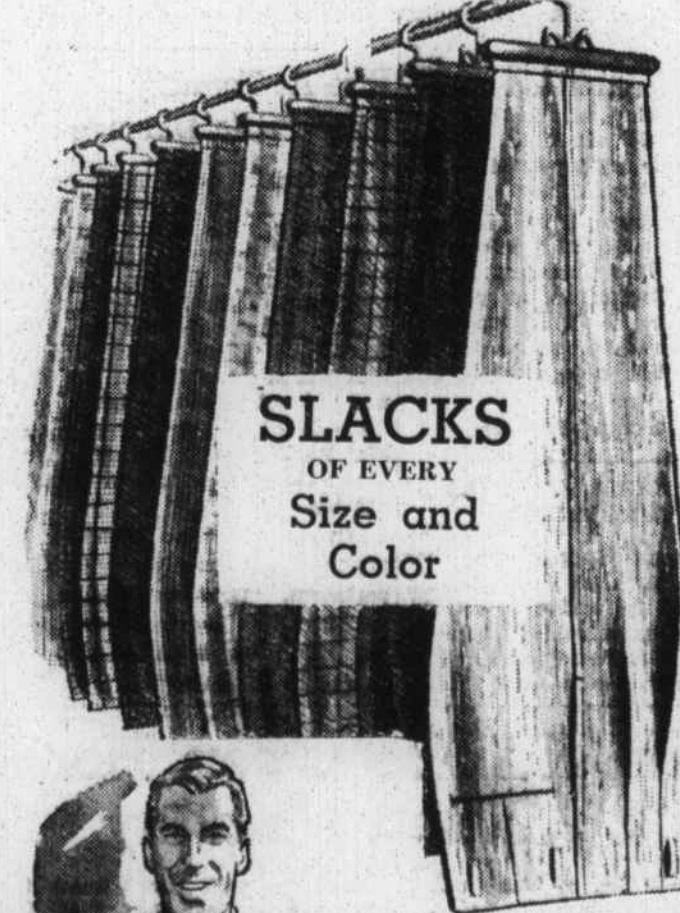
