 The champion female was consigned by Dr. A. P. Cline of Canton and brought \$500. The champion female was consigned by J. E. Holbert of Horse Shoe.

A total of 59 head of both horned and polled Herefords were shown. Of this number, 13 were bulls and 46 were heifers.
 Bulls averaged \$359, while heifers averaged \$324. Total sale average was \$332.
