A four-man team operates each section, including the team chief and three radio operators. The teams were under the command of Lt. J. W. Winfrey, Division radio officer, of Clyde.


Power for the three radios is supplied by a 10,000-watt gasoline driven generator in a trailer behind the radio truck.


