Leatherwood Tells DAR Of **Problems Facing Schools**

Lawrence Leatherwood, county superintendent of schools, gave an address on "Federal Aid to Education" at a meeting of the Dorcas Women Install Bell Love Chapter, Daughters of the American Revolution, Friday New Officers afternoon in the home of Mrs. T Lenoir Gwyn. In pointing out the importance of education, Mr. Leatherwood quoted Thomas Jefferson, who said, "If a nation expects to be ignorant and free, it expects what never was and never will be."

He told how the National Education Association has asked for Federal Aid as early as 1883 and discussed the Kelly bill which was introduced in Congress last July, explaining how it would affect Haywood county.






