Mrs. Smith discussed the customs of the Cherokee today as compared to customs during her early childhood, and answered questions asked by her audience.

Mrs. Roy Campbell, granddaughter of Col. Will Thomas, famous friend and apodite son of the Cherokee, displayed papers relative to the Indians which had belonged to her grandfather.

A book display was shown from the Haywood County Library's collection on Cherokee history.
