Waynesville Lags In TB Fund Drive; Canton Ahead

The Waynesville area is still nearly \$400 behind its goal of \$1,200 in the annual Christmas Seal sale, staged to raise funds to fight tuberculosis.

This fact was disclosed last week at a joint meeting of Waynesville, Canton, and Clyde TB committees to make plans for the chest X-ray survey to be held in the county in June.

By comparison, W. Lee McElrath reports that Canton has far exceeded its goal and has raised more than \$2,100.

Mrs. R. R. Campbell, Christmas Seal sale chairman in the Waynesville area, said that 1,800 envelopes containing seals were mailed out, but less than half of the recipients have sent in their money for the TB fund.

Dr. Jack Davis, chairman of the Waynesville TB Committee, explained that the local organization did not join the United Fund this year because of the policies of the national and state tuberculosis associations.

Local TB groups who join the United Fund and fail to conduct separate Christmas Seal drives have their charters cancelled and the state headquarters conducts its own drive — with all money collected going to Raleigh, the

Mountaineers Set New Scoring Record In Defeating Crabtree-Iron Duff Five

Stung by two straight defeats at the hands of Hendersonville and Enka, the Waynesville Mountaineers went on a scoring spree to overwhelm Crabtree-Iron Duff, 93-23, here Tuesday night and set an all-time scoring record for a Waynesville High basketball team. The margin of victory—70 points—also set a new WTHS mark.

The Waynesville girls also won, 51-48, but had to come behind for their victory. Crabtree led at the end of the first and third periods and the score was deadlocked at the half. A fourth period edge in scoring—14-10—finally brought the Mountaineers home safe.

Reserves played a prominent part in the Mountaineer victory—scoring seven points in the closing minutes of the second quarter and 27 in the final quarter. The Gold and Black dribblers led at the half, 43-11.

Carroll Hooper led the WTHS barrage with 18 points, followed closely by Don Jordan with 16. Tom Sparks also threw in a dozen. Clark and Hannah were best for Crabtree-Iron Duff with six each.

In the hard-fought girls' game, scoring was very close on both sides. One Waynesville forward (Carver) scored 19 points and Presnell of Crabtree netted the same amount. Fitzgerald of WTHS accounted for 10 and Smith did likewise for Crabtree. But Waynesville's top marksman—Agnes Roberson—netted 22 points to Best's 19 and that represented the margin of victory.

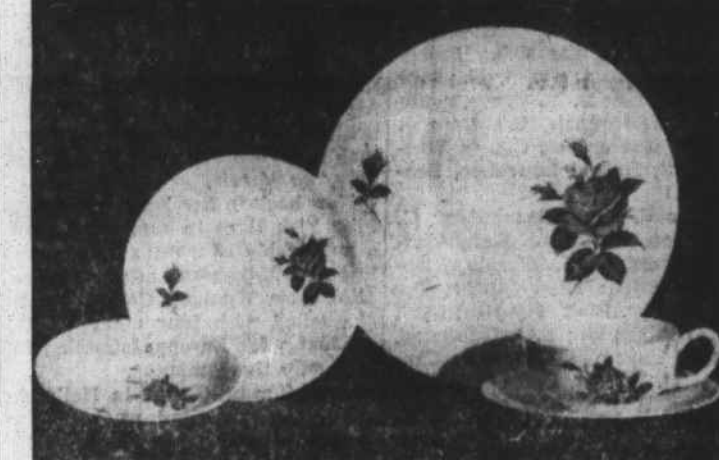
