

Gatlinburg Names Advisors On New Outdoor Drama

Knoxville editors, educators and business executives are represented on the honorary advisory council appointed to serve in connection with the Great Smoky Mountains Historical Association production of "Chucky Jack," historical drama by Kermit Hunter based in the career of John Sevier.

In addition, Tennessee Senators, Estes Kefauver and Albert Gore, as well as First District Rep. Carroll Reece have accepted appointments, according to announcement by R. L. Maples, president of the historical association with headquarters in Gatlinburg.

The new drama will be presented nightly, except Sundays, June 22 through August, in the Hunter Hills outdoor theatre under construction on State Highway 73, near Gatlinburg.

A number of business leaders of the area are included on the honorary advisory council, among them Carlos C. Campbell, insurance executive of Knoxville; who is secretary of the Great Smoky Mountains Conservation Association.

Harry E. Buchanan, of Hendersonville, N. C., president of the Cherokee Historical Association, producers of the Cherokee, N. C., drama "Unto These Hills," also by Kermit Hunter, is serving with the council, as is Ross Caldwell of Maggie Valley near Waynesville, a pioneer in the movement to launch the outdoor drama at Cherokee.
