Contest Under Way To Pick Top N.C. School Bus Driver

A statewide contest to pick North Carolina's best boy and girl school bus driver got official commendation today from Dr. Charles F. Carroll, Superintendent of Public Instruction and Motor Vehicles Commissioner Ed Scheidt, speaking as chairman of the Governor's Traffic Safety Council, sponsor of the event which will be repeated annually.

The contest is open to all student drivers, with two winners — a boy and a girl — to be selected from each of the State Highway Patrol's 30 administrative districts.

District winners, in turn, will compete in the finals to be held in Chapel Hill sometime after the end of the school year.

The winning couple each will receive a \$500 scholarship from the Governor's Traffic Safety Council in cooperation with the N. C. State Automobile Association.

Motor Vehicles Department officials said that North Carolina, with 7500 units, operates the nation's largest fleet of state-owned school buses. Driven almost entirely by students, they are on the move every day with more than 475,000 youngsters aboard.
