Cpl. Pritchard E. Smith of the North Carolina Highway Patrol spoke on Highway Safety at a meeting of the Waynesville Woman's Club Thursday afternoon in the First Methodist Church.

Cpl. Smith emphasized the importance of public concern over safety on the highway and stated that some accidents are caused by troubles in the home. He listed traffic violations leading to accidents as: failure to yield right-of-way, speeding, passing on a hill or curve, hit and run drivers; failure to signal properly, driving on the wrong side of the road, following too closely, and drunken driving. His suggestions for preventing accidents included obedience to traffic regulations, expecting the unexpected from the other driver, and keeping motor vehicles in good driving condition.
