Public awareness: A separate March of Dimes tells the story of polio to the American people and educates them to fight the disease. This ability would be reduced or lost in federation.

2. Fluidity of funds: A separate March of Dimes is essential because conditions over the country have to be met as they arise. and this requires mobility of funds, equipment and personnel. Any arbitrary regulation of budgets and expenditure at local community level (as is necessary in federation) would hamper the National Foundation's epidemic aid program as well as its longterm research and education pro
