

Girl Scout Cookie Sale Will Begin Tomorrow

Girl Scouts in the Waynesville area will launch their annual Cookie Sale tomorrow. The sale, beginning now as an activity of Girl Scout Week, will continue for two weeks.

The goal of the Pisgah Girl Scout Council, of which the Waynesville area is a part, is to sell 25,440 boxes of cookies. If this goal is achieved the Scouts will have \$4,000 for the development of their camp site near Brevard. Also a 2-cent bonus on each box is added to the individual troop treasury.

The Girl Scout Cookies need no special advertising. They are known to be always fresh and delicious and are perfect for serving with light desserts, for after-school snacks, and to clubs and church groups.

Mrs. William Ray is chairman of the sale in this area. Girl Scouts in the Waynesville area marked the opening of Girl Scout Week yesterday by attending church services in uniform. Other activities based on the theme, "This is Our Town," will be carried out throughout the week at regular troop meetings.

On Friday at 9:30 a.m. a number of girls will appear on a program televised over Station WLOS-TV, Asheville.

Women Use Talents To Pay Church Debt

The parable of the talents has been put into actual practice by members of the Woman's Society of Christian Service of Elizabeth Chapel Methodist Church in Ratcliffe Cove, resulting in a tenfold gain and full payment of a church debt.

On February 12, Mrs. James Medford, president of the WSCS, gave each member \$1.00 and requested that she use her talents to increase the amount as far as possible to pay a \$200 debt on cabinets in the church kitchen. Twenty-six members received the dollars.

Proof that none of the talents was buried came two weeks later when the group met in the home of Mrs. Glenn Hipps and brought \$284 for the treasury. As the members added their contributions, they told how they used the original dollars, adding their talents for cooking and sewing to increase the amount.

The final result — the \$200 debt paid in full and \$84 remaining in the treasury.
