Tar Heels Inquire Most About N.C.

North Carolinians, closely fol-lowed by New Yorkers, were the most frequent seekers of information about the Tar Heel State last year, records of the State Advertising Division of the Dept. of Conservation and Development show.

The bulk of 125,634 inquiries about the State in 1955 were about its vacation attractions, Advertising Director Charles Parker said. but the division also responded to many requests for general information. During the year inquiries came from all 48 states, the District of Columbia, and 96 foreign countries and territories.

The 10 states producing the most inquiries are, in order: North Car-olina 18,488, New York 15,097, Ohio 8,677, Pennsylvania 8,207, New Jersey 6,351, Illinois 6,168, Michigan 5,051, California 4,387, Virginia 4,017, and Florida 3,413.

Canada led foreign countries by a wide margin with 1,851 inquiries. Spain was second with 196. The other top ten were, in order: Indonesia 145, Brazil 143, Argentia 127, Iraq 126, England 97, Turkey 68, New Zealand 67, and Belgium


