been in a modern courtroom where a trial was being held. No judge sitting on a case would be allowed to try a friend or acquaintance. He must be absolutely The jurors listening to the evi-

dence also must have no prejudices. They must listen intently to what the witnesses of both sides have to testify, and bring in their verdict of guilty or not guilty according to the knowledge they thus gain and by what the judge informs them in his "charge."

No shouting crowds are allowed in the courtroom to hurl accusations at the accused as in Jesus' case. We shall see as we read the story how lacking in right and justice these trials were when our Lord was condemned to


