Junaluska Will Open For Fishing Monday, April 2

Tests Show Many Fish In The Lake

Fishermen, here is the news you have been waiting to hear.

Lake Junaluska waters will be opened to fishing Monday, April 2. The announcement came this morning from J. W. Fowler, Jr., superintendent of the Lake.

Members of the State Wildlife and Resources Commission recently made a test of the fish life in the 250-acre lake and announced that it is ready for the fishermen to take over

There are bass, bream and crappie in the Lake, and according to the recent check, they are present in large numbers.

The Lake is being opened earlier than was first expected would be possible.

The re-stocking program of about 12 months ago, plus the fact that the waters of the Lake were closed to fishing last year, gave time for the fish population to grow to such a size as to permit fishing.

All fishermen will be required to have a state and county license and in addition, a permit from the Lake. The season lake permits are \$7.50 while the daily permit is 50 cents.

Supt. Fowler said that Police Chief Everett McElroy and State Protector Williams would be on hand Monday to issue permits to fishermen

Last year the Lake went to considerable expense to rid the body of water uf carp, a rough fish. The lake was drained and all game fish were put into a pool until the clear-ance of carp had been completed. Many at the bass returned to the waters were 12 inches long.


