Western Carolina Featured In New Magazine, 'Sunrise'

Western North Carolina is featured in the May issue of "Sunrise," "The Magazine of Southern Living." The article, entitled "North Carolina's Land of the Sky," points out: "The magnificent mountains of North Carolina are a wonderful vacation land for Southerners. The air is crisp and cool, the roads good, and the scenery unforgettable."

The article reads, in part: "With the coming of Summer, the coolness and beauty of North Carolina's mountains hold special appeal to Southerners and small wonder why."

This Western part of the Tar Heel State is packed with "Land of the Sky" resorts and attractions. These include the Great Smoky Mountains, the Pisgah National Forest, the historic Appalachian Trail and the staggering views from the Blue Ridge Parkway.

The highest peaks in the Eastern United States are in this area — 223 of them over 5,000 feet and 93 over a mile high, with the spectacular summit of Mt. Mitchell towering over all at 6,684 feet above sea level.

The country is a lowlander's dream and a vacationing-by-car delight. Good roads with easy grades interlink resort centers mountain retreats, historic sites and the charming cities of this "Old North Colony."

During May and June the mountains are cloaked with azaleas, mountain laurel and rhododendron. All recreational areas along the Blue Ridge Parkway are open from May until October, as are the camping and picnic grounds of the national forests and the Great Smoky Mountain National Park.

Newest among North Carolina's scenic routes for vacation touring is a 12-mile spur of the Blue Ridge Parkway. This links Wagon Road Gap, on U. S. 276 in Pisgah National Forest, with Beech Gap in the high and handsome Devil's Courthouse country. The spur, at an altitude of over 3,500 feet, offers magnificent views of Mount

Pisgah and Looking Glass Mountain.

The trip over the climbing winding miles of the Blue Ridge Highway will be one of the highlights of your Summer tour of these Southern highlands.

This unusual "sky-highway" was built and is maintained especially for vacation touring and is in effect an elongated park as well as a motor route. There are no billboards to mar its scenic views and no commercial traffic is permitted. It runs through North Carolina from the Virginia line to Asheville, the heart of the highlands area.

West from Asheville, U. S. 19 is the skyway to the Great Smokies which gives easy access to the resorts of Waynesville, Lake Junaluska, Great Smokies National Park, the Cherokee Indian Reservation and Fontana Village at Fontana Dam. This is the famed TVA
