"How Can the Teacher and Nurse Work Together to Improve School Health Services?," led by Mrs. Fannie Martin, county health nurse; "How Can We Improve Sanitation in the Schools?," led by Mrs. Carl Ratcliffe, county school supervisor; "How Does the School Program Foster Good Mental Health?," led by Miss Alma Browning, Canton area school supervisor, and "What Are the Needs in Nutrition Education?," led by Mrs. M. G. Stamey, county supervisor.

The program was concluded with reports of discussion groups and evaluation and summary with Rowe Henry, superintendent of Canton District Schools, presiding.

The school health conference grew out of information gathered by a questionnaire circulated to county school teachers to determine the main problems in schools in connection with nutrition, sanitation, mental health, and other related subjects.

The conference today was attended by one or more representatives from all schools in the county—including those in the Canton district.

study the structure of the church and will deal with the philosophy of the original division as well as with the racial question. In taking its stand against segregation, the Methodist Church is now providing an administrative plan whereby an individual church, or a conference of churches, or an area of churches in the Central Jurisdiction can by a majority vote request membership in another Jurisdiction. For instance, a Central Jurisdiction Church in South Carolina may request membership in the New York East Conference after the two-thirds majority has approved. The New York East Conference would have to vote to accept that church into the conference by a similar two-thirds majority. If it is accepted, the church in conference would appoint the pastor for the church. The plan simply stated provides for voluntary removal of geographical and racial readjustment.
