

## 'Iris Time' Is Theme For Canton Flower Show

"Iris Time" is the theme for the flower show sponsored by the Rhododendron Garden Club, to be held in the assembly room at the Canton Library Friday, May 18, from 1 to 6 p.m.

Mrs. John Morgan is general chairman for the show.

The schedule announced this week is as follows:

General Rules—Only members of the four Canton Garden Clubs may exhibit. Entry books will open

at 9:00 a.m. and close at 11:00 a.m. Exhibitors will be allowed only one entry in each class and all entries must comply with schedule or they will be disqualified. Nationally Accredited Judges will be used and their decision will be final. The Standard System of judging will be used. A blue ribbon will be awarded for the first place, a red for second and a yellow for third. A tri-color award will be given in arrangements and in horticulture if such an award is merited. Entries must not be removed from the show until after 6:00 p.m.

Horticulture: Specimens must be grown by the exhibitor. All specimens should be properly labeled as to variety when possible. Horticulture label will be furnished with the entry cards. All specimens must be presented at the entry table in glass milk bottles with water ready to be placed.

Artistic Arrangements—Flowers used in this division need not be grown by the exhibitor. Painted, dry or artificial material will be disqualified.

Artistic Arrangement Division—Mrs. E. E. Conley—Phone 2773. Class 1. An arrangement featuring iris suitable for a hall table.

Class 2. A line arrangement stressing simplicity.

Class 3. An arrangement using your favorite container accessories permitted. Reserved for those who have never won a blue ribbon.

Class 4. An arrangement of fruit or vegetables or both, flowers and foliage permitted.

Class 5. An arrangement using all white including white container, foliage permitted.

Class 6. A miniature arrangement not to exceed 3" each dimension.

Bearded—1 stalk—name if possible.

Class 1. White.

2. Amoebas (white or tinted white standards with colored falls).

3. Plicatas (a light or white flower flushed, lined or stippled with a darker shade, particularly on the margin).

4. Light blue.

5. Dark blue and violet.

6. Medium blue.

7. Mauve and mauve blends.

8. Light pink.

9. Deep pink and rose.

10. Purple.

11. Browns and copper.

12. Red.

13. Yellow.

14. Blends (combination of yellow and one or more other colors).

15. Variegates (yellow or near yellow standards with deeper falls which may be either veined or solid tones of brown or purple).

16. Cream.

17. Collection of 3 named varieties of one color.

18. Collection of named varieties all different Bulbous Iris (Dutch, English and Spanish, 1 stalk).

19. White.

20. Yellow or orange.

21. Blue or purple Beardless Iris (Siberian, Spuria, and Japanese).

22. Any color—1 stalk.

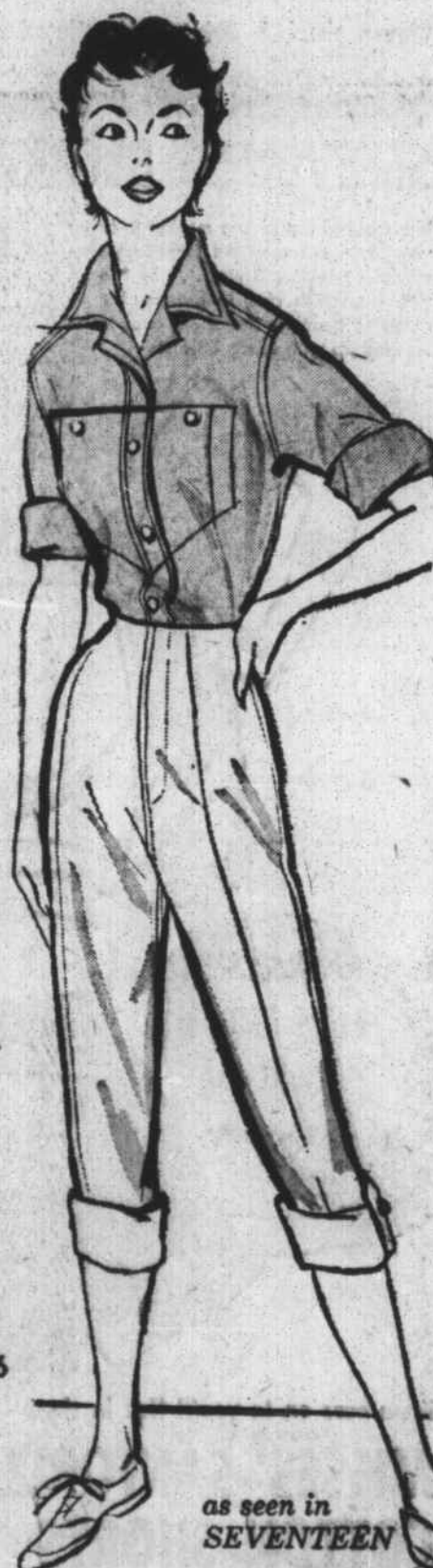
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
