General Assembly, another two million from Tennessee and the last five million dollars from the Laura Spelman Rockefeller Memorial Foundation speeded up the program of land buying. With Federal appropriations spurred by President Franklin D. Roosevelt and by Tennessee's Sen. Kenneth D. McKellar, the necessary funds were raised.

Finally, on Labor Day of 1940, the park was formally dedicated by President Roosevelt. With further development and consequent publicity, the park became the goal of thousands of visitors. Early in the action, a "rush" prediction had been made that some day there might be as many as a million visitors there within one year—last year park attendance totaled 2,361,437.

Thus 75 years of hard work toward maintaining the primeval forest of the Great Smoky Mountains as a National Park has reaped rich rewards. Millions of people have enjoyed trips through the unspoiled grandeur of the region—and those gray hairs still feel right at home!
