## WNC Heifer Sale Deadline Slated Friday, May 25

The deadline for applications at  
a Western North Carolina provi-  
dence bred-heifer sale, to be held at  
the Enka Pavilion August 23, is  
Friday, May 25, according to Coun-  
ty Agent Virgil L. Holloway.

All Haywood County producers  
who plan to enter animals in the  
sale are urged to have their applica-  
tions in the county agent's office  
by the 25th.

Rules for the sale are:  
1. Sales to start promptly at  
12:30 p.m. with lunch available on  
the grounds.

2. All animals must be in sale  
barn by 5:00 p.m. of day before  
sale.

3. Sale will consist of both  
Grade and Registered animals that  
are a result of artificial breeding  
to desirable proved bulls that have  
been located in an artificial breed-  
ing stud.

4. Only first calf heifers that  
have been dehorned will be accept-  
ed.

5. All heifers must freshen be-  
tween August 1 and November 1—  
with preference being given to ani-  
mals calving near to sale time.

6. All Grade daughters of Ashe-  
ville bulls must be positively iden-  
tified as to sire by securing through  
the technician a certificate of iden-  
tification issued by the stud.

7. Breeding dates must be fur-  
nished on all cattle. If bred arti-  
ficially the breeding receipt must  
be transferred to the buyer.

8. Registration and transfer pa-  
pers must be furnished on all pure-  
bred at seller's expense.

9. County selections must be  
completed by May 31, 1956.

10. Final selections will be  
made by a committee of out-of-  
county personnel by June 15, 1956  
—and this committee may reject  
any animal that in its opinion does

not meet the requirements as out-  
lined by the steering committee.

11. All animals must be properly  
fitted (clipped and clean) and  
halter broken. At each sale the  
animal judged to be best fitted will  
be sold without any commission  
charge.

12. All animals must be nega-  
tive to T.B. and Bangs test not  
more than thirty (30) days prior to
