Champion Foundations College Scholarships Go To Two Haywood Students

Awards of two four-year col-ge scholarships by the Champion sper Foundation were announced ere today by H. A. Helder, vice president and general manager of the Carolina Division of the Chamon Paper and Fibre Company.

The scholarship winners are ohn Ray Jamison, Jr., of Canton High School, and Sonja Sue Snyder of Waynesville High School. Their cholarships will amount to onehird of their typical college exuses for each of four years.


