FOUR-YEAR College scholarship awards have just been announced for these two Haywood students by the Champion Paper Foundation. Jamison will graduate from Canton high this month, and Miss Snyder will graduate from WTHS Monday.

Champion Foundations College Scholarships Go To Two Haywood Students

Awards of two four-year college scholarships by the Champion Paper Foundation were announced here today by H. A. Helder, vice president and general manager of the Carolina Division of the Champion Paper and Fibre Company.

The scholarship winners are John Ray Jamison, Jr., of Canton High School, and Sonja Sue Snyder of Waynesville High School. Their scholarships will amount to one-third of their typical college expenses for each of four years.

Similar awards are being made simultaneously at the Ohio and Texas Divisions of Champion through a new scholarship program initiated by the Champion Paper Foundation last December.

Jamison is the son of Mr. and Mrs. J. R. (Toby) Jamison of Can-

ton. His father is employed by Champion's Carolina Division. He plans to study medicine at Vanderbilt University.

Miss Snyder is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Jack Snyder of Hazelwood. Her father is an employee of the American Enka Corporation. She plans to begin a liberal arts course at Mars Hill College and continue at a senior college.

In addition to the student awards, the colleges and universities attended by the award winners will be given grants-in-aid by the Foundation.

A total of 21 students from high schools in Champion's operating areas in North and South Carolina were nominated for consideration for the Champion Paper Foundation awards.

Besides the two winners, three of these will receive token gifts in recognition of their high achievement in the scholarship competition. They are Duane Keppel Wait of Enka High, Barbara Edeath Owenby of Waynesville High, and Sarah Claire Perdue of Newberry (S.C.) High.

Selection of the winners in the Carolina area was made by a committee composed of A. M. Fairbrother, assistant general manager of Champion's Carolina Division, Dr. W. E. Bird, president of Western Carolina College, and Prof. A. J. Hutchins, retired superintendent of the Canton Public Schools.

Dr. Sensabaugh Dies At 96 In Dallas, Texas

Word has been received here of the death of Dr. O. F. Sensabaugh, a native of Waynesville, at his home in Dallas, Texas.

He had been active in the Methodist ministry for 77 of his 96 years and was the first Southern Methodist minister to cross the Continental Divide into Western Colorado.

Most of his 77 years in the ministry was spent in North and Northwest Texas, and included 27 years as presiding elder. He held pastorates at Fort Worth, Amarillo, Waco, and Waxahachie, among others. He had lived in Dallas since his

retirement in 1927. In 1915-18 he served the Dallas Methodist District as presiding elder, now called district superintendent, and during that time organized the Highland Park Church and helped locate Southern Methodist University.

He is survived by his wife, Mrs. Daisy Lane Sensabaugh; three sons, Dr. Leon F. and Lt. Col. G. R. Sensabaugh of Dallas, and Oscar F. Sensabaugh of Ballinger; a daughter, Mrs. Charles McClesky of San Antonio; 11 grandchildren; and 12 great-grandchildren.

Dr. Sensabaugh was a grandson of Samuel Fitzgerald, who for many years conducted a Sunday School Class in the Methodist Church on the location of the present Green Hill Cemetery. He was also a nephew of the Rev. J. R. Long, Methodist minister for whom Long's Chapel was named.
