Adventist Youth Stage Activities At Lake Junaluska

Over 800 Junior young people representing 18 Pathfinder clubs in North and South Carolina highlighted yesterday's (Sunday) activities for Seventh-day Adventists now meeting at Lake Junaluska.

The fair consisted of a tumbling exhibition by a Washington, D. C., tumbling team under the direction of Roy Battle. Archery and knotting contests, first aid demonstrations, camp crafts and drill teams demonstrated the accomplishments of each Pathfinder unit.

The annual Summer Bible conference opened last night. Some 2,500 people from Adventist churches in the 2 Carolinas are expected to be in attendance during the course of the week's meetings.

Outstanding speakers from world headquarters in Washington, D. C., Southern Union Conference headquarters, Atlanta, and New York and California, are scheduled.

W. A. Fagal, director and speaker of the Faith for Today TV show from New York will speak at the service tonight. The entire TV group, including the quartette, will have part in the program.

Does your kitchen boast an electric roaster? Then do try roasting a duck on it. You'll find this method of cooking duckling gives wonderful crisp skin.

Softened cream cheese mixed with a little grated orange rind, orange juice and sugar, makes a delicious topping for fruit. Serve it with canned blueberries or thawed frozen sliced peaches.

Mix a cup of cranberry sauce (unstrained) with a half of an unpeeled orange ground fine. Add about a quarter cup of sugar. Use as a filling for a white layer cake; frost with a fluffy white topping.

Cook diced celery just until tender-crisp and drain; mix with another cooked vegetable—carrots, peas or snap beans—for variety.

Put thick strawberry or raspberry jam on top of muffin batter—about a teaspoon for each muffin. Swirl it into the batter lightly with a teaspoon, then bake as usual.

A ripe avocado should be refrigerated; a banana, ripe or unripe, should not be kept in the refrigerator.
