

A spokesman explained that a-bout a million dollars had been allocated for the project this fis cal year but it will be used for something else. He added that a \$600,000 allocation is proposed for the road in the budget for the year starting July 1.

The road would be a connecting link between the proposed Foothills Parkway and the entrance to the Great Smoky Mountains National Park at Gatlinburg. "We had a little over a million doilars in the 1956 fiscal year budget for a section of the road," the spokesman said,

"Here it is close to the end of the fiscal year and we have no rights-of-way and the state says it doesn't know when it will be ready with them.

"Our 1957 fiscal year budget includes \$600,000 which was planned for use following up the mil-
