



## ANGLIN' AROUND

We have heard for many years that from the middle of June until late in August is no time to fish the warm water lakes of this section. Why? We do not exactly know. Of course during the month of June a number of fish spawn which curtails biting to some extent. And of course the water becomes warm and sometimes the fish hunt deeper and cooler water. But despite all of these we have heard, and had a little experience ourselves, that some nice catches have been brought in during this time of year.

Perhaps it is not altogether the fault of the fish. It can get rather hot out on a body of water at this time of year, and old Sol can really burn a fisherman that has not been exposed to the sun's rays for any length of time. Maybe the lessening of the number of fishermen is why there is a slump in the number of fish caught.

We know from experience that it all depends upon the angler whether he will brave the hot sun and the prospect of thunder storms to match his skill with that of our fished friends. If a man, or a woman for that matter, has the fishing fever, the time of year and the elements generally take a back seat. If they are only mediocre in their fishing and the sky is cloudy or the sun is beaming down to the point where a shady spot is preferred to fishing, then the shady spot generally wins out.

We have been trying out a relatively new lure for the past month. It is called a Shyster Spinner, and comes in several colors and three weights. You can secure this lure in 1-4, 1-3 or 1-2 ounce and it really works with a spinning outfit.

If you are strictly a bass fisherman, you will be disappointed in the Shyster. We have found that most anything in the lake will hit this lure, when they are hitting anything, that is.

Last Saturday afternoon on Fontana Lake we landed a variety of fish on a yellow-body and yellow feathered Shyster. To start the action we landed a smallmouth bass, just above the limit of ten inches, then a ten-inch broom or bluegill, whichever you prefer to call it. Not very long after that we boated an 18-inch, four-pound largemouth bass, and not long after that we caught a wall-eyed biter that was just under the 15-inch limit. That is not all, we landed several crappie on the same lure.

We think the Shyster is destined to be a popular lure in this section. Just from the way it works while in the water, we are of the opinion that it would also be a good lure for trout fishing in some of the cold water lakes that abound in this section. We have not had a chance to try it out in this manner, however.

If you are interested in securing one of these lure, most of the fishing tackle shops have them on display.

We have heard very little from

the trout fishing in the streams in this section, and therefore cannot report whether the fishing is good or not so good. Of course there have been a few good creels reported, but not nearly as many as earlier in the season.

There is still some fairly good trout fishing to be had back in the mountains, but most of it is hard to get to. Here again it is up to the fisherman as to whether he will brave the underbrush, and the possibility of encountering snakes and various animals of the mountains, together with the old faithful gnat that gives fishermen so much trouble, to get the native trout that everyone loves to eat. It is not a picnic by any means.

Jonathan Creek is still producing a good brown trout now and then. Richard Rhinehart landed a 6 pound 2 ounce, 25 1/4 inch brown in the Maggie Valley section. Richard was quite proud of his catch and didn't stop to see if there were other fish to be had in the stream, but immediately brought the fish into town to display his catch. Mr. Rhinehart has fished with a fish of this nature several times before, only to lose him, and after securing a stronger leader he managed to hold on this time. The fish was caught with a fly and spinner on a steel telescope pole and he had to go several hundred yards down stream before he was able to land the big fish.

Brown trout fishing has been rather good in Jonathan Creek for the past few years, and if the stream continues to be kept free of pollution will be good from now on.

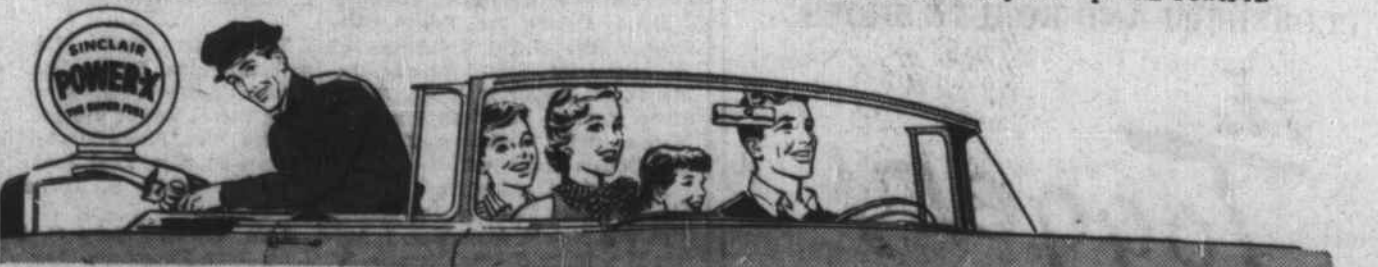
