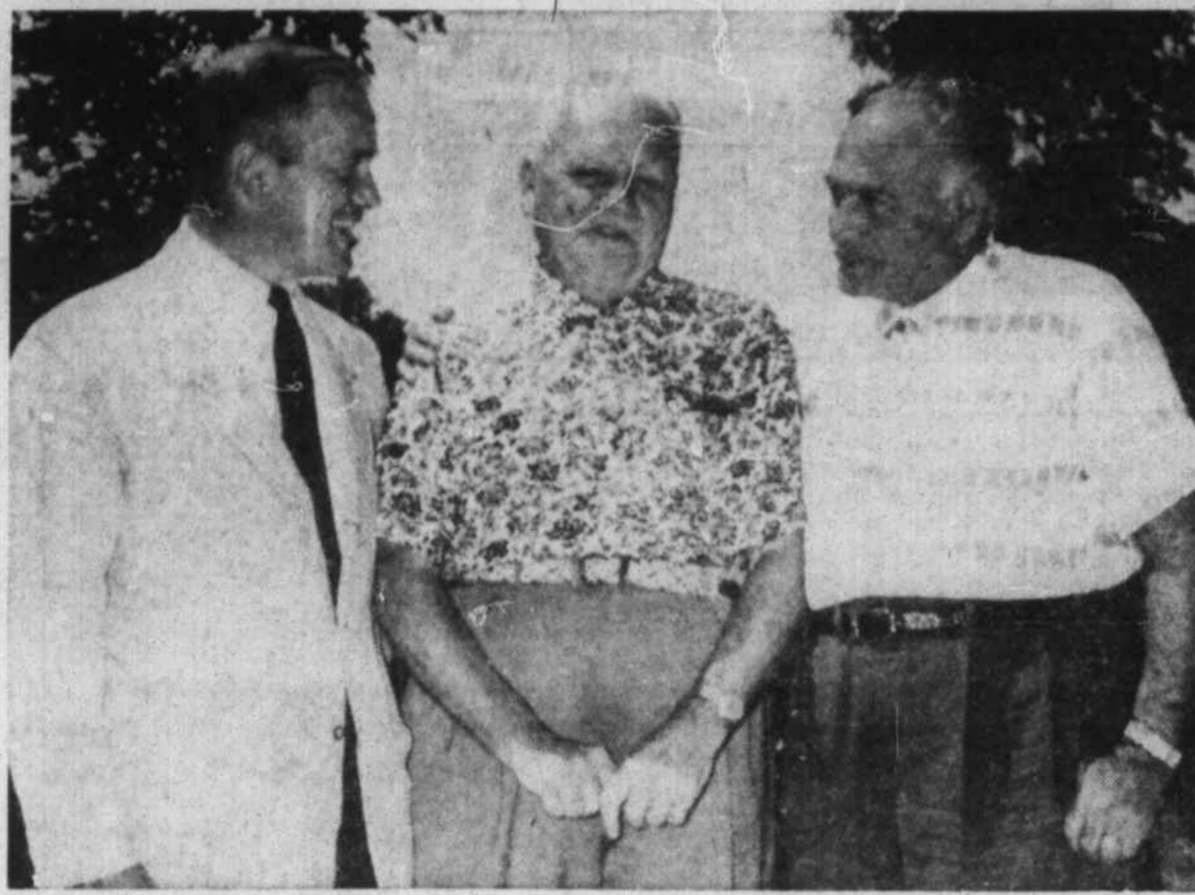

Mrs. J. R. Thomas' Grandson Wins AF Commendation

Air Force 1st Lt. James R. Buell, grandson of Mrs. James R. Thomas, Sr., of Waynesville and the son of the former Josephine Thomas of Waynesville, recently was commended in a bulletin sent to Air Force bases around the world for his role in saving the life of a pilot whose plane became disabled. Lt. Buell won praise from the Air Force for his skillful monitoring of a flight, which brought Capt. Walter T. Fay in to a successful flame-out landing at Patuxent Naval Air Station, Maryland, after the captain's plane developed engine trouble.

The bulletin read in part: "Lt. Buell's timely action in meeting with an unexpected situation... is a credit to his profession and helped save the Air Force a costly aircraft plus a pilot's life." Lt. Buell, whose parents, Mr. and Mrs. Odin Buell live at Buclinton, Calif., studied at the University of California for two years and at the University of Kentucky for three years, where he was graduated at the age of 20. He is now enrolled in summer school at the University of Colorado and will enter the University of Pennsylvania this fall to begin work toward a degree as a doctor of veterinary medicine.

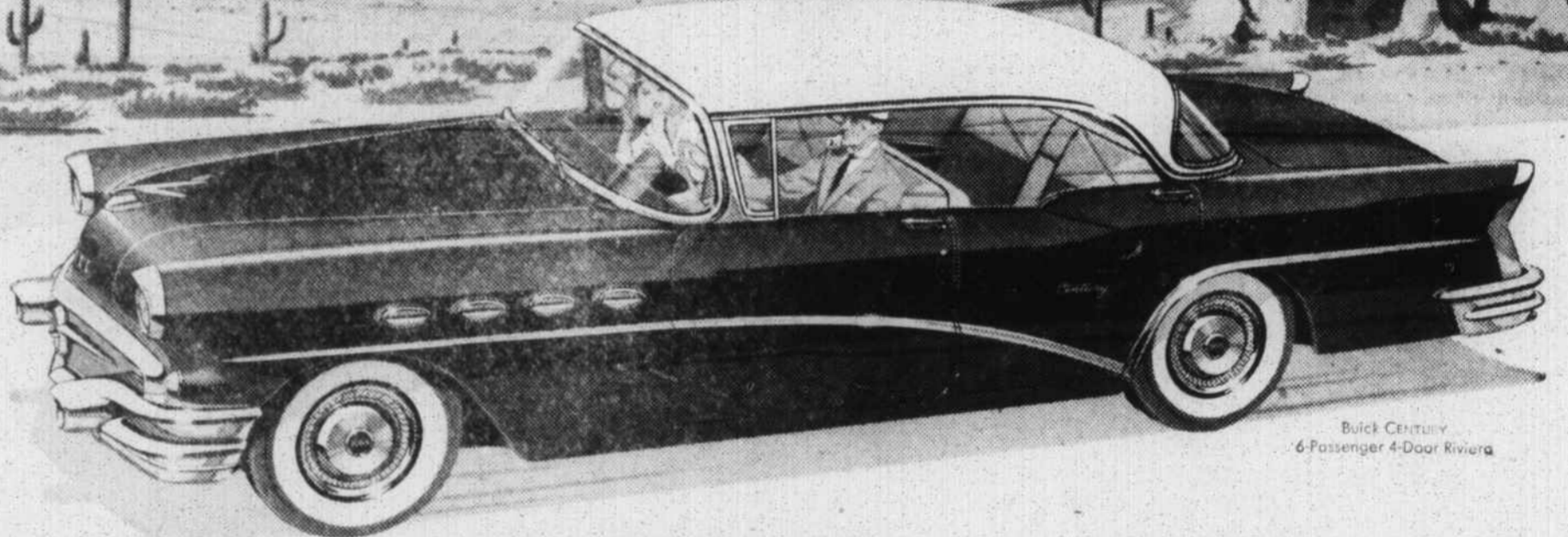
