The training school for church workers closed its first term Saturday. Enrollment numbered 404 workers and 45 faculty members. The director is the Rev. M. Earl Cunningham of the Methodist Board of Education staff in Nashville, Tenn.

He said special features this week will include an audio-visuals program at 8 p.m. Tuesday in the main auditorium to demonstrate effective use of religious motion pictures and film strips in Christian education.

At the same hour in Shackford Hall a panel will discuss "The Place of Mass Media in Christian Education". Dr. Charles H. Johnson of Southern Methodist University, Dallas, Tex., will be the moderator.

Mid-week speakers at the 8 p.m. platform hours in the auditorium will be the Rev. Webb B. Garrison on Wednesday, and the Rev. Dr. Henry M. Bullock on Thursday. Both are staff members of the education board in Nashville.

The Rev. Mr. Garrison will discuss "The Local Church Emphasis in the New Quadrennium". Dr. Bullock, editor of Methodist church school publications, will speak on "The Bible in our Curriculum".

Speaking at 11 a.m. daily in the auditorium, today through Thursday, is the Rev. W. Russell Shearer of Birmingham, England, former president of the British Methodist Conference, who is lecturing in the United States under the auspices of the National Council of Churches.

Noted Englishman Giving Lectures At Lake Junaluska

A distinguished British visitor, the Rev. W. Russell Shearer of Birmingham, England, opened a four-day series of lectures this morning at the Lake Junaluska Methodist Assembly.

He will speak at 11 a.m. through Thursday in the main auditorium.

A graduate of Cambridge University, the Rev. Mr. Shearer is a former president of the British Methodist Conference, an elective position comparable to president of the denomination, and is widely known as one of England's most forceful preachers.

He recently visited British military forces in Malaya, and has just completed a tour of Methodist mission stations in India and other points in the Far East. He has also been active in the Rotary Club in England and other civic organizations.

The Rev. Mr. Shearer supervises 400 Methodist churches as superintendent of the Birmingham district. He is speaking in the United States under the auspices of the National Council of Churches. Mrs. Shearer, treasurer of Women's Work in the Methodist Missionary Society of England, is with Mr. Shearer.

Scaredy-Cats Apt To Live Longer, Survey Finds

Don't laugh at your wife because you think she's a scaredy-cat. The National Safety Council says feminine prudence and skill are playing a part in holding the accidental death toll of women to about half the toll of men!

The Council's statistical yearbook, "Accident Facts," which is just off the press, also points out, however, that men are more exposed to danger because of their occupations and activities.

More women than men were killed in falls in 1954—the latest figure available. But the difference was not very great—551. And in all the other seven principal causes of accidental deaths, men outnumbered women.

Motor vehicle accidents killed 26,725 men, 8,861 women; falls, 9,610 men, 10,161 women; fire burns, 3,372 men, 2,711 women; drownings, 5,450 men, 884 women; railroad accidents, 2,129 men, 487 women; firearms, 2,016 men, 265 women; poison gases, 881 men, 342 women; and poisons (except gas), 779 men, 560 women.
