

'A Scenic Wonderland' Is Flower Show Theme

"A Scenic Wonderland" is the theme of the annual flower and vegetable show which will be held tomorrow (Friday) in the Waynesville High School Cafeteria from 3 p.m. until 10 p.m.

Sponsored this year by the Waynesville Council of Garden Clubs, the show promises to be one of the best ever held. The groups participating are the Richland, Mountain View, Primrose, Skyland, and Tuscola Clubs.

All amateur gardeners are invited to enter exhibits in compliance with the rules and regulations of the flower show committee and entries must conform to the schedule.

The exhibits will be divided into four divisions: artistic arrangements, children's arrangements, horticulture specimens, and special exhibits.

Exhibits for garden club members will be entered tonight from 7 until 9 o'clock. Other exhibitors may enter their exhibits from 8 until 11 o'clock Friday morning.

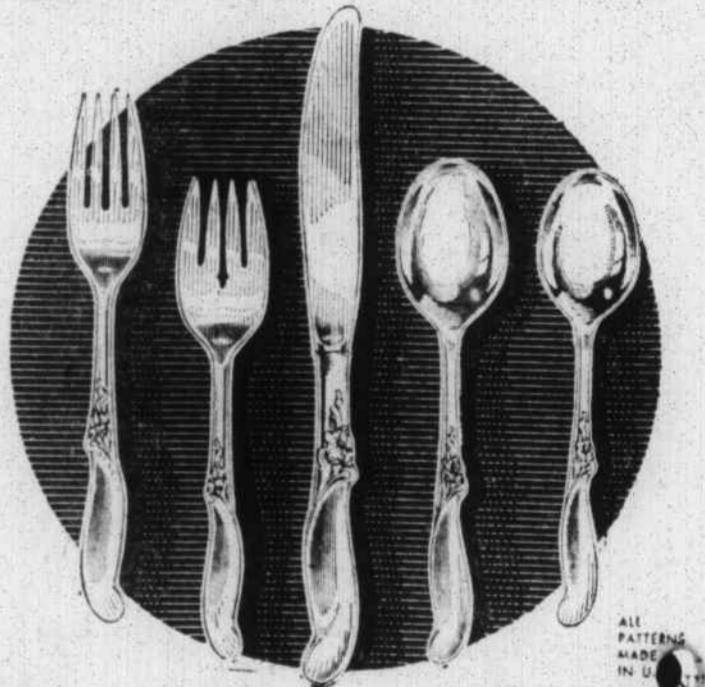
