

U.S. Forecasts Bigger Crop Of Burley Tobacco For '56

(By the Associated Press)

The Agriculture Department Friday forecast a burley tobacco harvest of 476,467,000 pounds for this year, reflecting an increase from earlier predictions because of July rains.

The total burley production for 1955 was 469,977,000. The average yield per acre last year was 1,514 pounds. The estimate for this year is 1,528 pounds.

Most of the burley belt received considerable rainfall during July, the board said.

It added that in a few areas the rainfall was excessive, resulting in some damage in scattered areas from washing and standing water.

production was forecast for Kentucky to top Class A, air cured tobacco growing states. This was slightly over the 1955 Kentucky yield of 304,290,000. The indicated yield per acre in Kentucky this year is 1,475 pounds per acre as compared with 1,470 last year.

The forecast production of other leading Southern states growing Class 3, air cured type burley follows:

Tennessee—96,100,000 pounds as compared with 92,318,000 last year, with an average forecasted yield of 1,550 pounds per acre for 1956 as compared with 1,538 pounds per acre in 1955.

Virginia—20,800,000 pounds as compared with 19,584,000 in 1955, with an indicated yield of 2,000 pounds per acre, as compared with 1,920 in 1955.

North Carolina—19,110,000 for 1956, and 18,620,000 for 1955, with an indicated yield of 1,950 pounds per acre for this year as compared with 1,900 pounds in 1955.

'56 Figures To Be Good Honey Year

If you've got a sweet tooth this is a good year to buy some honey.

W. A. Stephen, State College extension beekeeper, says that honey production in most parts of North Carolina is good this year, and the honey is of excellent quality.

Here are a few tips from Stephen.

Most honey is packed with a "balloon" in the top of the jar. When the jar is inverted the balloon rises, the honey may be either thin or hot or both, but when the balloon rises very slowly in hot weather, you've really got something.

Stephen explains that this is the result of low moisture content. Since much of the honey has been stored during the month of May when the weather was dry, it was no trick for the bees to remove moisture from the nectar as they made it over into honey.

"Consequently, most honey has good quality and is of heavy body this year," he concludes.

QUESTION: How many chickens do you need to provide the minimum requirements for an average family?

ANSWER: If good stock is secured and well cared for, five layers should provide enough eggs for two persons. But remember that layers start in the spring come into production in the autumn and so out of production in the spring

Curiosity Pays For Farmer In Wake County

Curiosity paid off for a Wake County farmer.

Millard Privett of Wendell, Route 2, says he started using artificial insemination on his cattle a few years ago just to satisfy his curiosity.

He didn't really believe that the offspring could exhibit the fine dairy qualities he was seeking, but he had heard so much about it he decided to give it a try.

Assistant County Agent C. L. Boone says that now Privett is definitely an advocate of artificial breeding and wouldn't think of keeping a bull.

Boone is just hoping that more farmers will become more curious and use artificial breeding with their family cows.

The USDA reports that almost 800 million pounds of this country's food surplus was donated to school children and needy persons in this country and abroad during the last half of 1955.

In this country, surplus food went to about 11 million school children, about 1 million persons in charitable institutions, 100,000 Indians, and about two and a quarter million persons in needy families. Altogether, food distributed to these groups totaled nearly 300 million pounds.

Food given away in this country is handled through state facilities, with the state government taking full charge and responsibility for distribution. Needs in this country are given priority, and sufficient quantities are reserved to satisfy all requests from state governments.

Foods were also distributed to hungry people in 70 foreign countries around the free world. Eighteen nongovernmental United States welfare agencies took part in this disposal, distributing almost 500 million pounds of food during the latter half of 1955.
