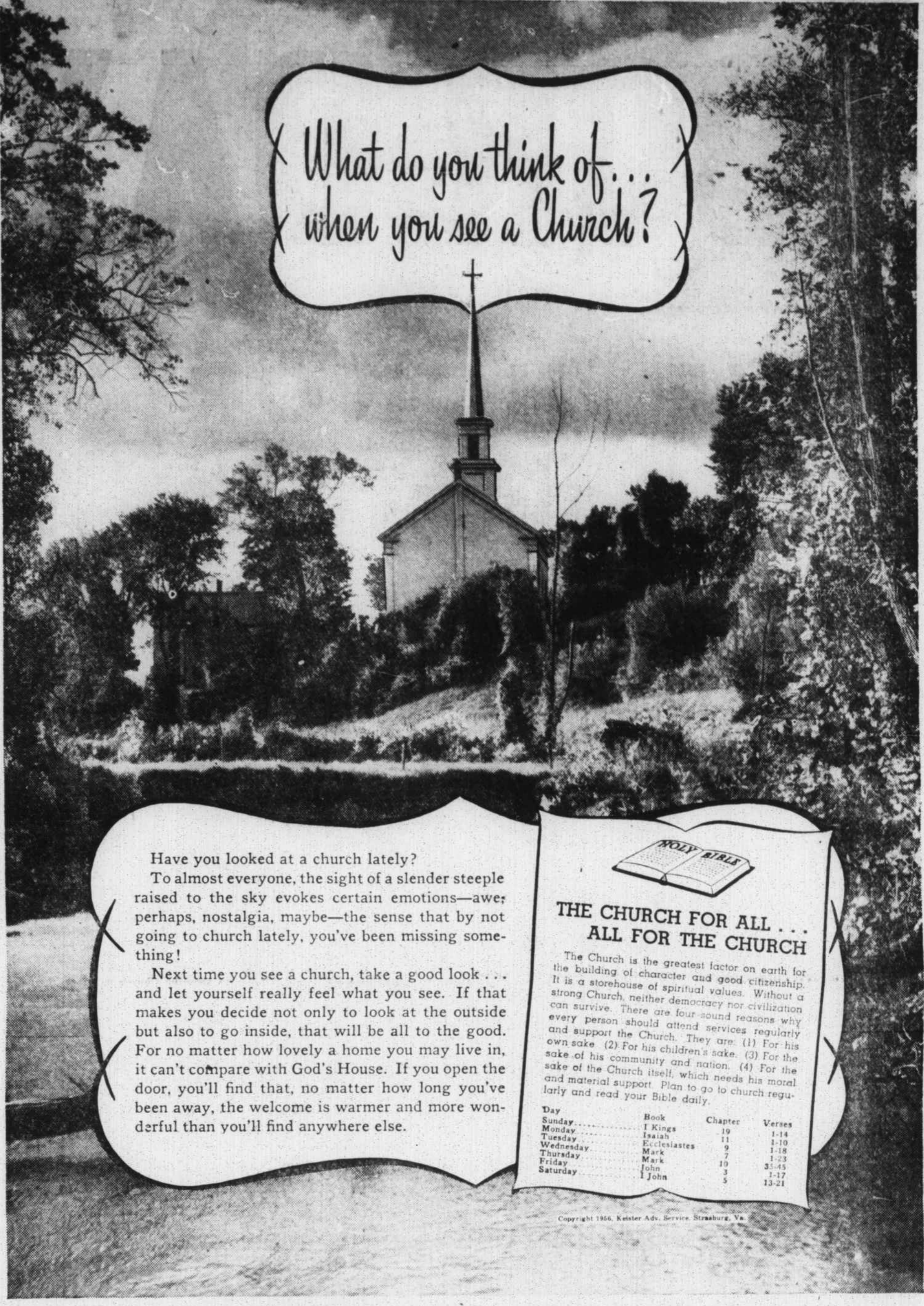
CHRIST TEACHES US THE IDEAL WAY TO ACT IN OUR RELATIONS WITH OTHERS

Scripture—Luke 6:27-31; 10:30-37; James 2.

NEWMAN CAMPBELL
 BEGIN this lesson with words telling us the way to conduct ourselves in relations with others. Here are the words: "Love your enemies, do good to them that hate you, bless them that curse you, pray for them that despitefully use you." Jesus did that. When suffering on the cross, he prayed for his Father in heaven to forgive those who were torturing him.
 We are struck, we should not think; if our cloak is taken, we should offer our coat also. We do not expect no return. Most of us have never suffered by being struck in anger or by having clothes taken from us, but there are thousands in various parts of the world who have.
