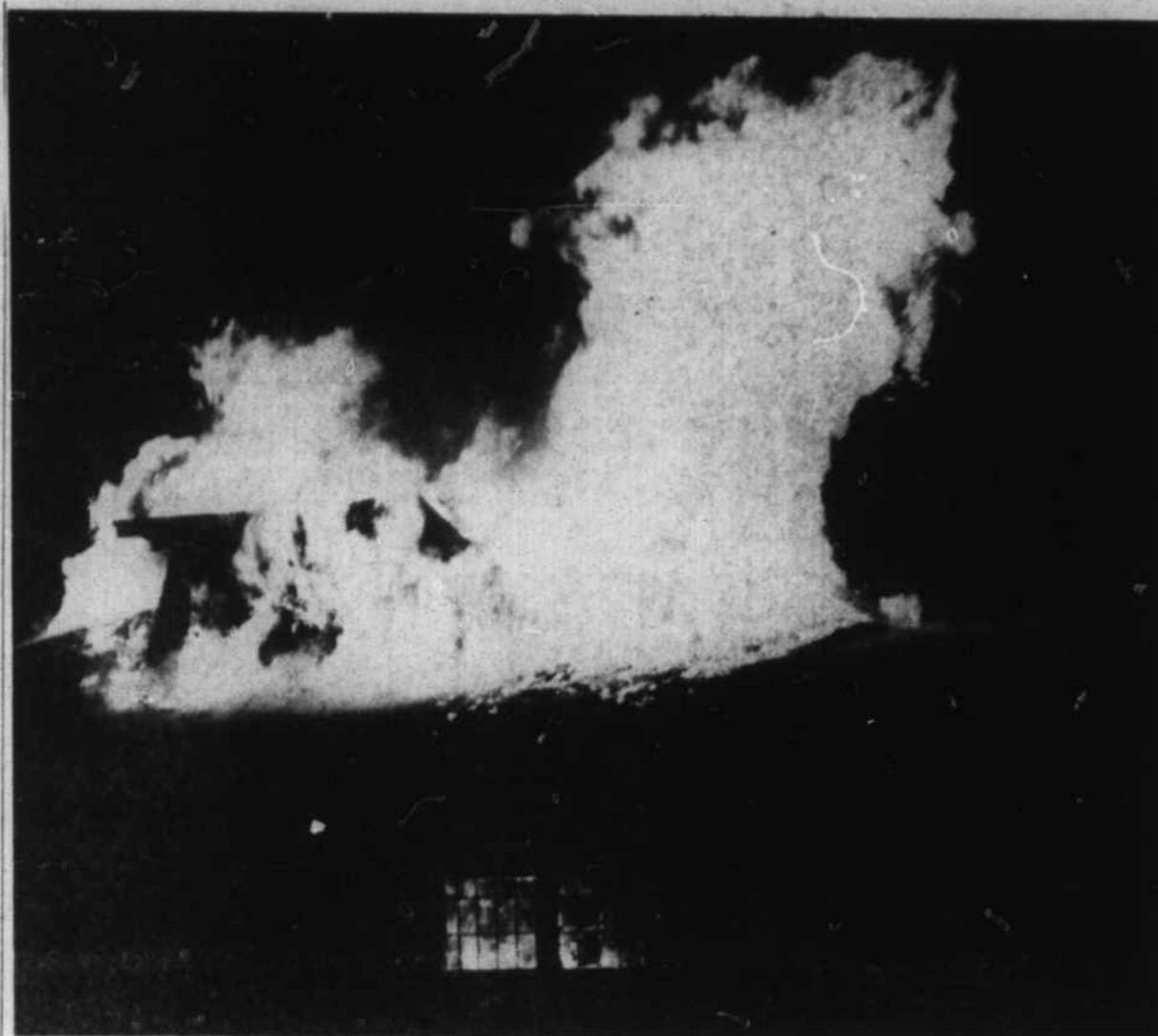

The truck was termed a total loss, with damages estimated at \$500.

An 18-year-old girl learning to drive - Joyce Ann Ledford of Lake Junaluska - was hospitalized Sunday as the result of an accident in front of Long's Chapel Methodist Church near the lake at 4:40 p. m.

Patrolman Dayton reported that Miss Ledford attempted to turn into a driveway, but gas going too fast and swerved to the left side of the highway where her vehicle struck an apple tree head on.

Miss Ledford was admitted to Haywood County Hospital for treatment and observation, but was discharged today.

Riding with her were John Ervin Jaynes, 17, who was teaching her to drive, and Mack Medford, 18, both of whom were uninjured.

Damage to the car was estimated at \$200.

Miss Ledford was charged with exceeding a safe speed and driving on the wrong side of the road and Jaynes was charged with aiding and abetting those two violations.

Clyde was the scene of one accident at 1:15 p.m. Sunday when a 1941 Chevrolet truck driven by Ed Joe Gregory, 47, Route 3, Canton, was struck by a 1953 Cadillac driven by Donald L. Lawless of Washington, D. C.
