Mrs. Walker pointed out reasons why farmers should belong to an organization; that through organized efforts legislation affecting farmers might be passed on state and national levels; that farmers are the ones who should be most concerned with legislation affecting them; and that farm women should be vitally concerned about legislation that affects the income farm families derive from the farm.

She cited as an example of legislation that has affected thousands of American farmers recently, Public Law No. 480. "That law which now enables American farm surpluses to be sold to foreign countries originated in the mind of Jack Lynn, a former Haywood County Farm Agent," Mrs. Walker stated. "The law will reduce the stockpile of surplus to the extent that further acreage cuts in some commodities will not be necessary, at least for the present," she stated.
