Israel Manufacturer Has Record In Making Shoes

Footwear manufacturing processes invented and developed here in Haywood County have been the basis for a firm in far-off Israel to establish a world-wide record for the manufacture and sale of footwear. This fact was revealed during the recent visit of Dov Gafni, General Manager of Hamgaper in Israel, a Welco-Ro-Search affiliated factory.

Hamgaper is the only factory anywhere in the world that produces and sells enough footwear

to fill the needs of every other person in the country where it is located. Most of the footwear made by Hamgaper is produced by processes originated at Welco-Ro-Search and much of the equipment on which they are made was made here.

Mr. Gafni's recent visit to Welco-Ro-Search was for the purpose of inspecting new equipment and processes recently developed and to study new techniques now being used at Welco.

Cherokee Indian Fair To Open Next Week - Oct. 2-6

The 39th annual Cherokee Indian Fair will open on the Reservation here October 2. It will continue daily through Saturday, October 6.

The president of the Fair is Jarrett B. Blythe. Other officers are Arsene Thompson, vice president;

Jack Jackson, general manager; and Charlotte Sneed, secretary. Mr. Blythe is also chief of the Tribe, and Mr. Thompson, who is pastor of an Indian church, has had for seven years one of the top Indian roles in "Unto These Hills".

The Fair is unique in the United States because it is solely an Indian production and the exhibits and prize events are limited to Indian competition. Since it was started in 1914 the event has outgrown the limits of a small community exhibition, and now is ranked in interest and importance as equal to the best county and regional fairs in this part of the South.

Of chief interest will be the daily "stick ball" games, the arts and crafts exhibits of Indian sculptors, basket weavers, potters and wood carvers; displays of great varieties of colored Indian beans and strawberry popcorn, and the needle work and canning of Indian housewives.

Also to be seen nowhere else is an Indian Baby show, bow and arrow and blow gun contests, and Indian dancing.

October 5 is school children's day. On this day the Cherokee Indian High School will meet Andrews high school in a football game on the Fair Grounds.

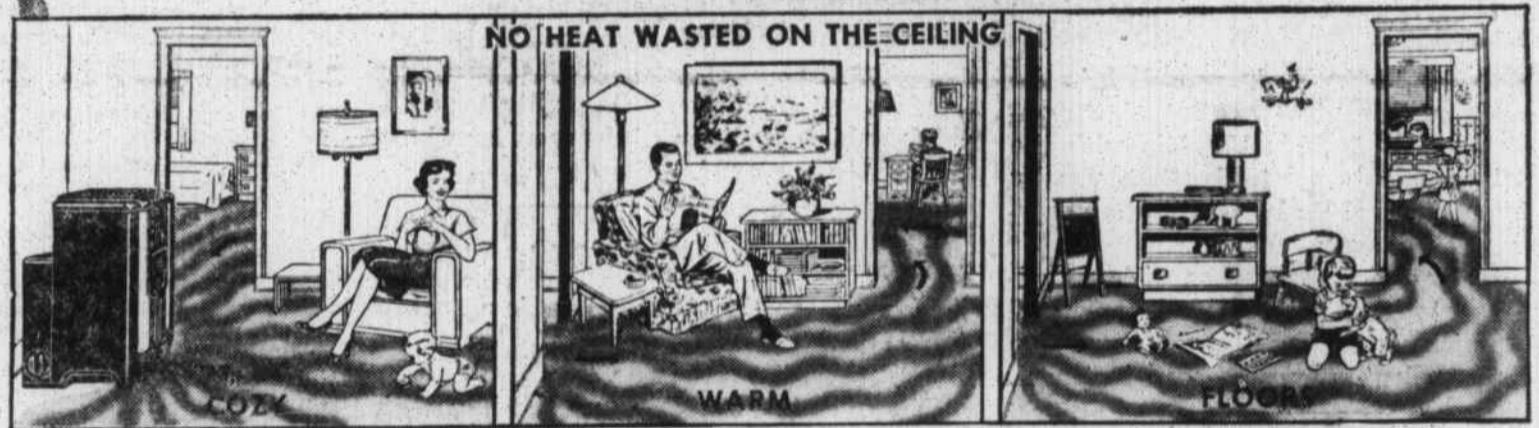
