In the article, which is presented along with eight State Fair photographs, six of them in full color, the genial fair manager reveals some of the secrets of his unusual job and offers tips on enjoying and getting the most out of any fair. Written in the lighter vein, the story is entitled "Why I Get a Kick out of Fairs".

The amusing and interesting article carried an important message however, even though it recounts many varied personal experiences of the North Carolinian. The message: come to the fair and enjoy yourself, but don't forget that the real purpose of any fair is to educate you a little, to bring you up to date on the world around you. "What we are really offering," says Dorton in the article, "is news, information, education."

3. Bring the youngsters, let them try the rides. They are carefully checked for safety every day. There are even miniature rides for the very small children at most larger fairs.

4. Decide on a meeting place on the fairgrounds in advance and get together there every hour or so. You'll feel easier and no one will get lost.

"You'll find every year that we're presenting new accomplishments. Along with the high-ho and fun, we're offering new ideas on farming and farm living. You see, we're always trying to teach. That's our real pitch. The races, shows, ostriches are just the come-on," concludes Dorton.

Here are a few tips on getting the most out of the N. C. State Fair, October 16 through 20, or any fair for that matter, as listed by Dorton:  
1. Bring the whole family and prepare to spend several days. You simply can't see it all—the educational, scientific and industrial exhibits—in one day. And it's an easy way to bring yourself up to date on the big world around.  
2. Be careful with your money—don't go for risky games where

the odds are on the other side.

### 'Safety Pays In All Ways'

"SAFETY PAYS IN ALL WAYS" — The National Safety Council says to respect pitchforks. Never throw a pitchfork and put it where you will not fall on it, or step on it. Store it safely in order to keep the children away from it.

Paint all gasoline cans red, and respect them. Remember gasoline is something to be handled carefully and used in a correct way.

Don't hang extension cords on nails, or wrap them around pipes. An extension cord hung around a nail in one building for three years causing no harm. But then it short circuited; and the fire that it started cost \$200,000.00.

DO HOME DRYCLEANING OUTDOORS—If drycleaning must be done at home, do it out of doors where chances of dangerous accumulations of vapor are small. Never use flammable liquids such as gasoline, benzine, or naphtha. Use specially prepared cleaning solutions or kerosene to clean grease and dirt from machine

parts and bearings. Never use gasoline for such purposes.

Many insecticides are flammable. Do not spray in the presence of open flames, lighted cigarettes, or other sources of ignition.
