The same procedure applies to pre-bagged apples on a weight basis, which is a big item for apple men today," he continued.
Ketner has found that his contacts with the vegetable market in early spring and throughout the summer has enabled him to keep a steady flow of modernly packaged apples going to the market.
Orchardmen are finding that the theory of quality, plus modern packaging is in keeping with the demands of the ever-changing market, and the tastes of the buying public.

"There was a time when a housewife ordered her food from the grocer by phone, and had them delivered. She seldom darkened the door of the store. Today the housewife personally selects the foods she buys, and packaging plays an important role in what she picks up and puts into her market basket." Ketner went on to explain.

"Attractive packaging is modern merchandising for applesmen, as well as merchants," he concluded.
