

### Basic Rules For Sewing Corduroy

SEWING ON CORDUROY — Clothing specialists give the following tips on sewing with corduroy. You can sew corduroy as easily as any cotton fabric, if you first pay attention to these basic rules:

Remember that corduroy has a nap, and the direction of the nap affects the fabric's color. When the nap runs up, the color tone is darker—when the nap runs down, it's lighter.

You can't pull a thread on corduroy.

To avoid a two-tone look in your garment, place all pattern pieces so that the nap runs in the same direction. Pin and cut with the nap running up for a richer effect.

Cut extra-large notches on high pile corduroys that ravel easily. Regular-size notches may fray off.

When sewing wide wale corduroys, the ribs should be matches, like stripes. When placing your pattern, follow rules for matching stripes.

For a smoother look, a lighter-weight fabric is best for facings on corduroy. Cotton keeps the garment washable.

Gathering tip: on bulky corduroys, hand-gathering is easiest. Take even stitches—1/4" long, 1/4" apart.

Press corduroy very gently on the wrong side. Place a heavy Terry towel between pile-side and ironing board. Press with a steam iron, or dry iron over slightly damp cloth.
