## Cardinals Remain Unbeaten

The unbeaten Clyde Cardinals rolled to their eighth straight Skyline-A Conference victory Friday night by trampling Tryon, 40-0, on the Polk countians' field.

The win also marked the six shutout scored by the Cardinals, who have tallied points to their opponents 12.

Johnny Rogers opened the scoring for Clyde by going over in the first quarter on a long Cardinal drive.

He and Danny Caldwell added touchdowns in the second quarter to give Clyde a 20-0 lead. Rogers ran one conversion and Bob McCracken kicked the other.

McCracken crossed the goal line in the third quarter and booted another conversion to make it 27-0. Danny Haynes and James Bussell rolled out the scoring for the Cardinals with six pointers in the fourth quarter and McCracken kicked one of the two extra points.

The next game for Coach Griffin's Skyline-A leaders will be their only non-conference game of the season — a clash with traditional rival Bethel at 7:30 p.m. Thursday at Canton stadium.

## Meeting Set Here Thursday To Discuss Family Courts

One of eight meetings to be held in the state to determine the requirements of a system of family courts in North Carolina, as recommended by the Governor's Youth Commission, will be conducted in Waynesville Thursday.

It has been announced by the State Board of Public Welfare at Raleigh.

Sponsored by the commission, these meetings are a part of the survey being conducted for the commission by the National Probation and Parole Association, according to the announcement by Nat S. Crews, commission chairman.

The Youth Service Commission was created by an act of the 1955 General Assembly and the members were appointed by Governor Luther H. Hodges. The commission's purpose is to advise the governor on matters relating to the prevention, control, and treatment of juvenile delinquency in North Carolina. The members of the commission, in addition to the chairman, are: State Senator Adam J. Whitley, Jr., Smithfield; Mrs. W. T. Carpenter, Lenoir; Mrs. Ernest B. Hunter, Charlotte; and A. B. Gibson, Laurinburg.

Representatives of the National Probation and Parole Association as well as members of the governor's commission will participate in the series of meetings. Special invitations have been sent out to persons who have official responsibility in the area of juvenile and domestic relations courts and child welfare. Others are included who have special interest in or official responsibility for law enforcement, judicial action, or probation services relating to families and children or to young offenders now under the jurisdiction of the criminal courts. The meeting will be open to the public and all interested persons are invited. Chairman Crews said.

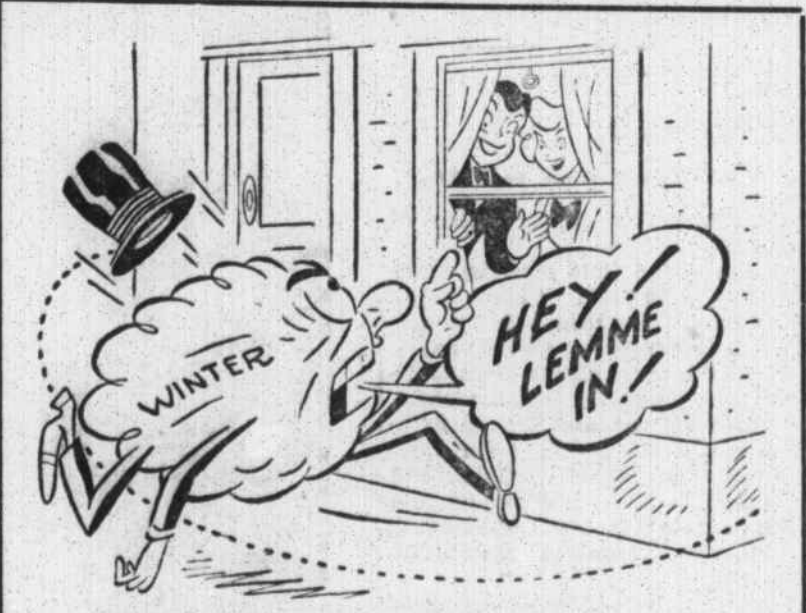
