**Small Business Failures Show** 15% Increase

FAILURES. The semi-annual report of the Small Business Administration just released shows that business failures increased 15 per cent during the first six months of 1956 compared with the same period of 1955.

The hardest hit category of business was construction, with failures in the building industry increasing 25 per cent over 1955. Failures in manufacturing and retail trade were 12.2 per cent over

CAUSES. The SBA said this about the causes of the increase in failures:

"The increase in business failures this year has resulted primarily from the decrease in residential construction, the cutback in the automobile industry, and the more competitive situation which exists in textiles and apparels,"

There is no doubt that the big factor behind the failures in the construction industry is the increasing intensity of the "tight money" situation.
