INADEQUATE WIRING SYMPTOMS

You don't have to be an expert to tell whether your home is suffering from weakness of the wiring. There are many little symptoms that show up every day that you live in an inadequately wired home. You have probably known of them all along but you may have thought something else other than poor wiring to be responsible

Here are some symptoms of inadequate wiring: 1. Lights flickering and dim-

ming when appliances are turned

2. Appliances operating slowly or not as well as they should. Heat appliances, such as toast-

ers, irons, room heaters, warming up too slowly. 3. Fuses blowing or circuit breakers tripping too frequently. 4. Radios fading or sounding

scratchy when an appliance is 5. TV picture that shrinks in size or "winks" when other ap-

pliances go into action 6. Too few outlets and switches

where you need them. 7. Multiple "octopus" connections used for several appliances at once.

8. Long cords strung around the room in order to connect lamps or appliances.


