

Haywood Football Teams Conclude Season Friday

All Three Teams Play At Home

The curtain will be rung down Friday night on the 1956 football season in Haywood County when Waynesville will play host to Owen, Canton will entertain Lee Edwards of Asheville, and Bethel be at home to Sylva.

Clyde rang down its gridiron curtain Friday night against Glen Alpine.

In a game at WTHS stadium at 7:30 Friday night, the Mountaineers will be a decided underdog against a speedy band of Owen Warhorses that now hold down the No. 3 spot in the Blue Ridge Conference with a 7-2 record. The visitors also are Buncombe County champions this season.

Owen (formerly Black Mountain-Swannanoa) lost early-season games to Hendersonville and Lee Edwards, but then came back to bowl over their next seven opponents in a row.

In their last start, the Warhorses mauled the Brevard Blue Devils, 27-7, a team that has whipped Waynesville, 22-7. In three other games, however, the Mountaineers have done better than Owen. The Gold and Black trounced Reynolds 38-0, while the Warhorses won a 20-0 victory, and the former crushed Enka 46-6, while Owen's margin was only 33-7. Against runner-up Hendersonville, Waynesville lost by only 7-6, while the Warhorses went down 18-7.

In other Owen games, the Warhorses won over Erwin, 21-0; Marshall, 48-7; North Buncombe, 59-0; and Asheville School, 14-6.

Last year, the position of the two contesting teams were reversed. After an impressive 27-0 win over Elizabethton, Tenn., the Mountaineers invaded Asheville Municipal Stadium heavily favored to beat a so-so Owen squad but the Warhorses raced to a 27-21 victory.

Owen scored touchdowns on a 61-yard drive, an 80-yard punt return, and an 85-yard kickoff return, and a 36-yard pass. The Mountaineers tallied their six-pointers on a 54-yard march, a 26-yard drive after recovering a fumble, and a 37-yard pass from J. W. Stevens to Jack Lewis.

In the game Friday night will be four Owen players who had a big part in the win over Waynesville last year—Edwin Gill, David Pruitt, Freddy Enslver, Larry Gravette, and David Hamby.

Once again the Warhorses will present an offense that capitalizes on speed and deception — and is probably the closest facsimile in the conference to the Canton

Black Bears' attack. After two 20-0 victories over R-S Central and Elizabethton, Tenn., respectively, the Mountaineers will return to the Blue Ridge Conference in an effort to end the season with a 6-3 mark.

Wins have been over Bethel, Reynolds, and Enka in addition to the above two teams, while losses have come at the hands of Canton, Hendersonville, and Brevard.

Rounding out their season, the Black Bears will seek to protect their undefeated mark against a triple-A school, Lee Edwards, who has a comparatively small but talented team.

The Maroons have beaten Owen, 20-6; Salisbury, 20-14; Burlington, 12-0; Enka, 6-0; Gastonia, 12-9, and have tied Greensboro, 14-14.

The Canton Black Bears have won eight games with ease, rolling over Bethel, Enka, Waynesville, Asheville School, Blue Ridge, Hendersonville, and Erwin. In only one game were the bruins extended—being forced to come from behind a 6-0 deficit at halftime to whip Brevard, 19-6.

10 Fined For Violating N. C. Game Laws In Pisgah

Ten men have been fined and/or given suspended sentences on charges of violating game regulations in the Pisgah National Forest, U. S. Commissioner James P. Gilliam announced Monday at Hendersonville.

Four of them, charged with using 30-06 rifles and spotlights to hunt, were fined \$250 apiece with four months suspended sentences. Gilliam identified them as Hollis Rhodes, 48, Grover Thackston, 48, Stanley Billingsley, 31, and Donald Billingsley, 18, all of Greenville, S. C.

Joe J. Woodring, 21, of Brevard was given a three months suspended sentence and fined \$50 on a charge of using a rifle in the forest.

Herbert Woodward of Brevard, charged with using a spotlight, was fined \$25.

Lewis Meece of Brevard, charged with using a spotlight, was fined \$25.

Adam Justice of Waynesville, charged with using a pistol, was fined \$50.

J. H. Bradburn and Ray Rigdon of Brevard, charged with using a spotlight, waived hearings and were bound to federal court under \$200 bonds.
